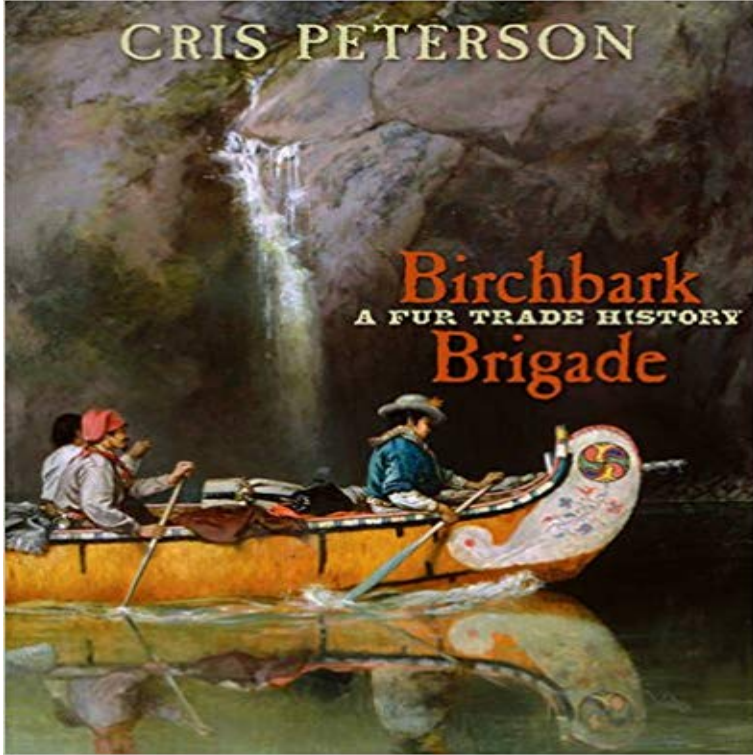


Birchbark Brigade: A Fur Trade History
